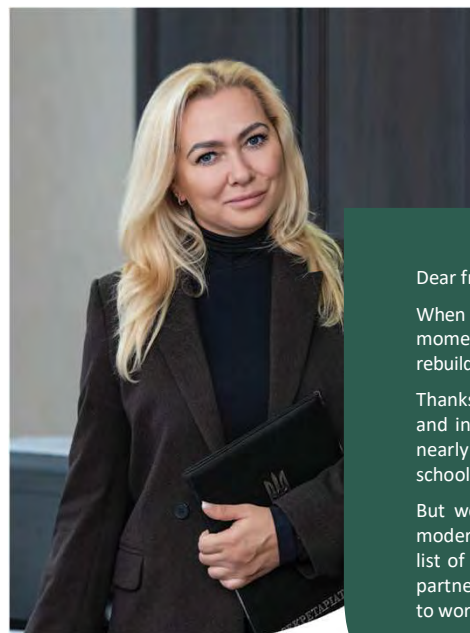

I invite you to become part of this future. Irpin is open to ideas, business, innovation, and shared success.

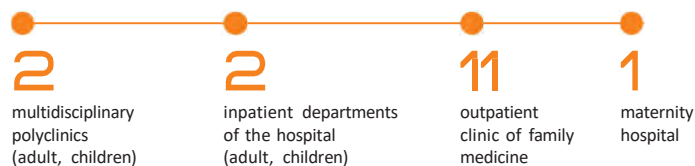

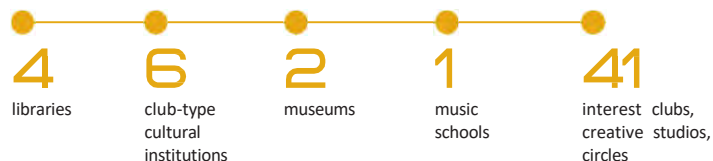

ABOUT IRPIN: THE PAST AND THE PRE-WAR PERIOD

Irpin is a city that flourished in the heart of the Kyiv region — inspiring artists, attracting families and entrepreneurs, and becoming in just a few years a symbol of rapid development, modernity, and quality of life. It is more than just a suburb of the capital — it is a distinctive Ukrainian city that combines a rich cultural heritage with ambitious strides into the future.

Once a quiet summer retreat beloved by writers, artists, and scholars, Irpin earned the nickname «Ukrainian Parnassus» — home to the creative works of Maksym Rylsky, Andriy Malyshko, Pavlo Tychyna, and Ostap Vyshnia. But in the 21st century, Irpin began to transform at an astonishing pace. It became an example of effective governance, an open community, and bold urban planning.

Over the past decade, the city turned into a modern center of comfort and livability. Its development budget increased 55-fold. Irpin built and upgraded:

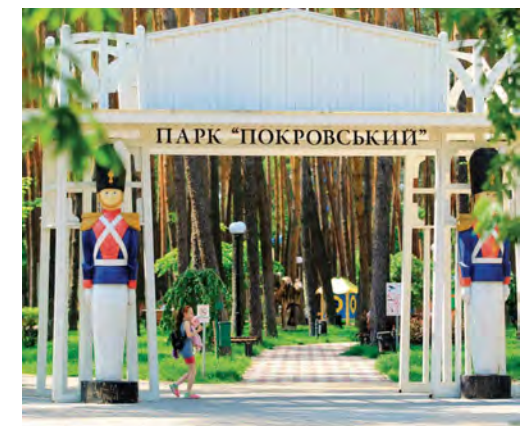
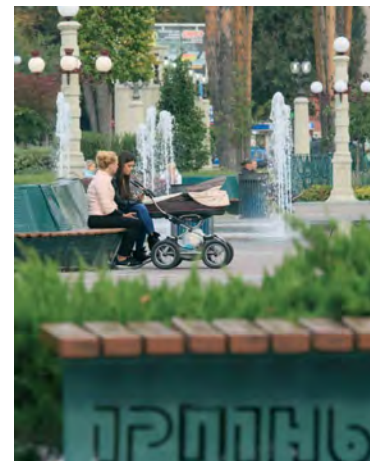
- 7 new educational institutions
- 5 family medicine clinics
- 17 green zones — parks, squares, alleys, and public spaces
- 64 renovated roads and 35 kilometers of sidewalks
- 120 surveillance cameras
- 60 units of new utility equipment
- 1,000 LED streetlights

- 45 modernized residential buildings.

Irpin is a city of social justice. 270 land plots and 52 apartments were provided to ATO veterans and families of the fallen; another 24 apartments went to doctors, teachers, and social workers.

It is a city where everyone has the space to grow: more than 12,000 self-employed entrepreneurs helped shape a new local economy.

Irpin stands as a model of what a modern Ukrainian city can be: green, safe, innovative, and deeply humane. Before the war, it was living proof that real change is possible — and even today, after painful losses, that spirit of renewal has not faded.





ABOUT IRPIN: THE PERIOD OF HOSTILITIES IN 2022

Irpin is a frontline city that stopped the invasion. In February 2022, this picturesque suburb of Kyiv became a bastion of resistance against the Russian onslaught. Streets that had echoed with children's laughter only a day before were shaken by explosions. A city that had been flourishing was suddenly turned into a battlefield.

Here, civilians became soldiers, volunteers became commanders, and basements became shelters for children and the elderly. Irpin's Territorial Defense forces, ATO veterans, volunteers, and ordinary residents rose to defend their home. The first clash occurred at the «Zhyraf» checkpoint. Then came the defense of key city points — a fight for every street. Homes were set ablaze, but courage never burned out.

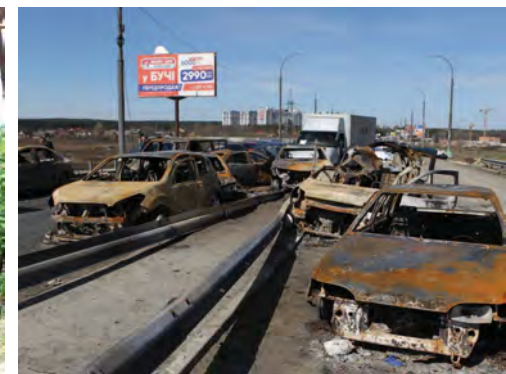


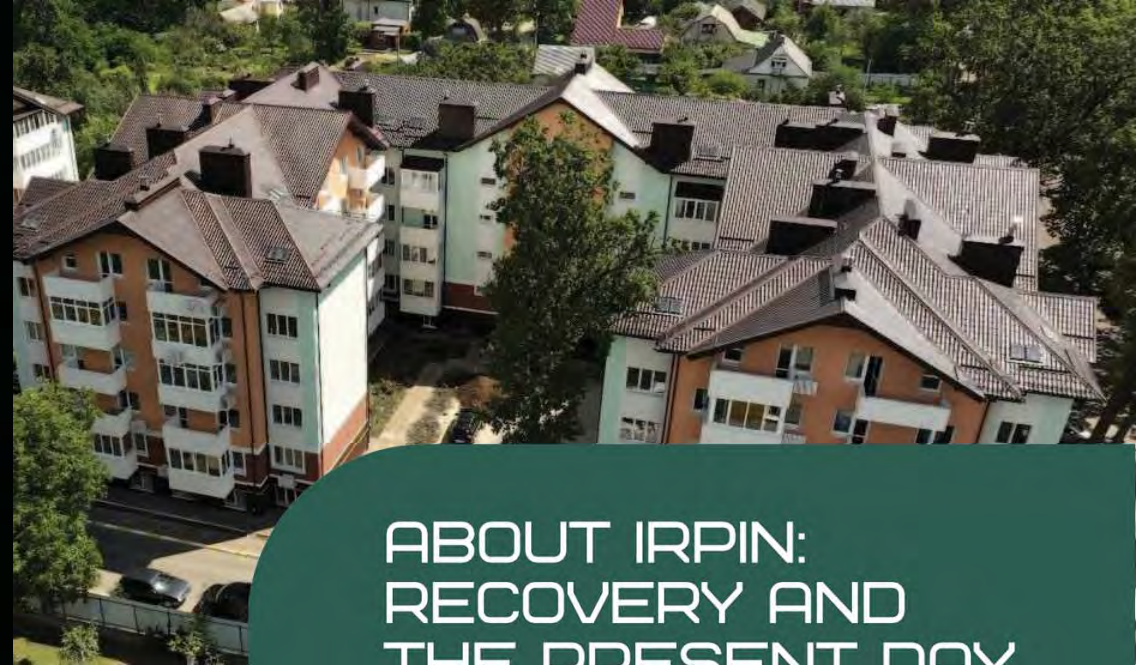
In just 25 days of battle, Irpin held the line, breaking the enemy's momentum and blocking their advance toward Kyiv. Enemy convoys were destroyed here, and the city became a symbol of resilience. Over 30,000 people were evacuated through the "road of life" in Romanivka. Irpin lost 39 heroes — our defenders, our neighbors. But it gained a new identity — the identity of a Hero City.

Irpin is proof that even a small Ukrainian city can change the course of history. Every inch of this land is soaked in bravery. Every day is a reminder

and a tribute. Irpin is a city that never fell — and never will.

In 2022, Irpin stood strong. But the cost of this victory was devastating — over 70% of the city was destroyed. The fire of war ravaged residential neighborhoods, schools, hospitals, kindergartens, and cultural institutions. A total of 634 apartment buildings, more than 2,600 private homes, and dozens of social infrastructure sites were damaged. From February to April, the city teetered on the brink of humanitarian catastrophe.





ABOUT IRPIN: RECOVERY AND THE PRESENT DAY

Yet Irpin not only endured — it began coming back to life almost immediately after liberation. Thanks to three years of tireless efforts by the local community, the state, and international partners, the city has been able to restore:

- 523 apartment buildings
- 1,460 private homes
- 10 schools and 13 kindergartens
- 10 outpatient clinics, 6 hospitals and polyclinics
- 3 cultural institutions and 15 boiler houses
- Over 20 modern shelters for children

Among the restored institutions are Irpin Lyceum No. 3, rebuilt with support from UNICEF for over 230 million UAH, and the “Linguist” Lyceum, renewed thanks to the Azerbaijani SOCAR Foundation with investments exceeding 125 million UAH. Record investments have also been made in kindergartens, funded by the governments of Lithuania, Germany, Portugal, Turkey, and the Portuguese city of Cascais.

In the healthcare sector, all outpatient clinics and key hospitals have been restored. With support from the Red Cross, USAID, the Ministry of Health,

and various charitable organizations, Irpin’s medical system has regained its capacity to save lives.

The residential sector suffered the greatest losses. Over 1,100 private homes were completely destroyed, and nearly 500 apartment buildings required major repairs. As of today, more than 2,000 residential properties have already been restored — including 523 apartment buildings and 1,460 private homes. Numerous recovery projects are being implemented by UNITED24, IOM, “Restore Home,” NEFCO, and the FNLO.

Entire streets are being brought back to life — such as Bahirova Street, where 42 new private houses have already been built. From ashes have risen new facades, roohops, sidewalks, and playgrounds. And all of it has been rebuilt with safety in mind: shelters, reinforced foundations, solar panels, and upgraded boiler systems.

Whole neighborhoods are returning to life. Children’s laughter once again echoes in kindergartens, clinics are open, and streets have been cleared. Educational institutions are now equipped with secure shelters, inclusive spaces, and modern dining facilities.

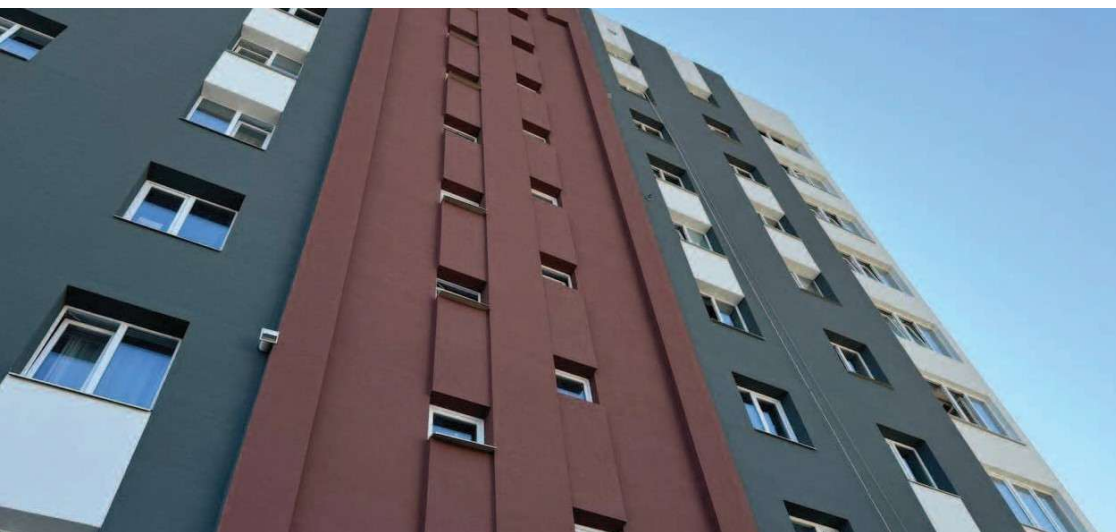
The «eRecovery» program is now in operation — thousands of Irpin residents are receiving compensation for destroyed housing.
